Encouraging

Opportunities

Students can be involved in various opportunities, which recognise their contribution to both school and wider life. At The King David School, students can be involved in 'Built In' or 'Build Up' opportunities.











A Built In opportunity is one that is embedded in the curriculum; for example, school camps and Nitzan.

Build Up

A Build Up opportunity, however, is one separate from the curriculum; for example, school musicals and DAV Debating. Students can also participate in various external opportunities. These are referred to as 'Build Up in the Community'.



Students may also wish to propose new opportunities at The King David School. They are welcome and encouraged to do so. To commence the process, students can complete the <u>'Student Offering Proposal Form'</u>



Levels





Within each recognised opportunity, Kinor David establishes three distinct levels of involvement. The three levels vary in degree of contribution and commitment. Each level ultimately contributes points towards domain badges.

The first level, **Participate**, requires a minimum of 5 hours of active and consistent engagement in an opportunity, and it constitutes 10 points.

The second level, **Facilitate**, requires a minimum of 10 hours of engagement in which a student enables and organises involvement in an opportunity, and it constitutes 20 points.

The third, and highest level, of involvement is **Initiate**. This requires over 20 hours of engagement in which a student creates and/or expands upon opportunities. It is awarded 30 points.

Recording

Students will have an opportunity to document their involvement in Kinor David every fortnight during Kesher (homeroom) via myKDS. For each opportunity in which they are involved, students will document or submit the following information:











- Term
- Domain
- Opportunity
- Level
- Qualities (select 3)
- Hours of involvement
- Staff member/supervisor
- Evidence

This information is logged on myKDS. Once a student believes that they have met the requirements for either a blue or gold badge, they will submit their data. Students, as part of the documentation process, will select a staff member as the supervisor of their opportunity. This staff member will be notified of their application and will either approve, decline, or request that the student edit and resubmit their application.

Further, at the end of each term, students will have a Kesher Gadol lesson dedicated to Kinor David. This will provide an opportunity for students to write reflections about their involvement in Kinor David during that term. These reflections will ask students to respond to the following questions:

- What did you achieve?
- What are you proud of?
- What did you find challenging?
- What qualities did you exhibit?
- What are you looking forward to?

At the end of the year, students will have written four separate reflections, which provide an overview of their experience within Kinor David.

Celebrating

Recognition

Students will receive a badge in recognition of their engagement with a respective domain. Two badges are awarded per domain. Students are awarded a blue badge once they have received 70 points in a chosen domain. Students are awarded a gold badge once they have received 100 points in a chosen domain and have successfully completed an interview with the Kinor David Committee. The 100 points must include a Facilitate and Initiate. Students can be awarded badges across multiple domains. Badges will be awarded at select assemblies throughout the school year.

Badge Design and Placement

Each student involved in the program will receive a Kinor David badge. The Kinor David Badge contains an image of a gold harp against a blue background. The strings on the harp symbolise the five domains. The badge will be displayed at the top of the left lapel on their school blazer.

Below the Kinor David badge, students will place any blue or gold badges awarded in each domain. These domain badges include the name of the domain in Hebrew and a background colour reflective of the level of attainment. In the instance where a student receives a blue badge and then, at a later date, receives a gold badge, only the gold badge will be worn.

Reports

Students, staff, and parents can view student involvement and progress in the program at any time via myKDS.

Students in Years 9 to 12 will receive a semester report of their involvement in Kinor David, as communicated in a Kesher Report, which reflects participation in various domains and their ongoing work towards badge attainment.

At the end of Year 12, graduates will receive a statement and certificate that reflects their participation in Kinor David.
